# Teen Slang

Terms All Parents Should Know

Not all teen slang is bad - some of it is creative, fun, and even humorous! However, depending on context, some terms can be a bit of a concern and may even signal that your teen is dealing with serious issues or making major life decisions without your knowledge.

**TEEN SLANG: EVERYDAY TERMS**



**ATE**  
When your teen says someone "ate," they mean they ate it. Whether it's a friend's outfit or a baseball shirt, "ate" is all about doing something really well.  
**EXAMPLE:** "Did you see her dress? She totally ate that look!"

**BET**  
This slangy "Bet" is another way of saying "okay" or "sure." If you tell your teen to clean their room and they reply with "bet," that's a good sign. They agree to do it.  
**EXAMPLE:** "Can you help me with the groceries?" "Bet!"

**BUSSIN & GAS**  
Both these terms are compliments. If something is "bussin" or "gas" it means it's really good or cool. Teens love their food metaphors.  
**EXAMPLE:** "This pizza is bussin!"

**CRINGE**  
Cringe is that feeling when something is just as awkward or embarrassing, you can't help but react. Teens use it a lot when talking about moments or things they find super uncomfortable.  
**EXAMPLE:** "That movie was so cringe."

**LOWKEY**  
This term is all about keeping things on the down low. When a teen says they "lowkey" want to do something, it means they're not too loud about it but still interested.  
**EXAMPLE:** "I lowkey want to go to that concert."

**SLAY**  
If someone is "slaying," they're absolutely killing it, literally or not. They look like they're the star of their own movie - confident and charismatic.  
**EXAMPLE:** "You're slaying in that outfit!"

**GREEN FLAG**  
Just like a green light means go, a "green flag" in someone means they have qualities worth cheering for. It's the opposite of a red flag and is definitely a good thing.  
**EXAMPLE:** "He's always so kind to everyone. Total green flag!"

**MAIN CHARACTER ENERGY**  
If your teen talks about someone having "main character energy," they mean that person is living their life like they're the star of their own movie - confident and charismatic.  
**EXAMPLE:** "She has such such main character energy."

**IT'S GIVING**  
When something or someone is "giving" a certain vibe, your teen is using a trendy way to describe their energy or appearance. It's all about finding a vibe or look to an idea or feeling.  
**EXAMPLE:** "This room is giving cozy vibes."

**GIRL DINNER & GIRL MATH**  
These are all about celebrating girl power in fun, quirky ways. A "girl dinner" might be a girls' night out at a restaurant, and "girl math" could be a funny way to talk about making decisions. Both are lighthearted and positive.

**TEEN SLANG TERMS THAT MIGHT RAISE EYEBROWS**



**DELULU**  
If someone's being "delulu," they're lost in their own world, and not in a good way. It's about being unrealistic.  
**EXAMPLE:** "I'm trying to be a YouTube star without actually doing anything."

**ERA**  
Talking about being in a certain "era" is like saying they're going through a phase. It could be anything from "my adolescence" to "my heartbreaker era." It's about expressing current feelings or stages in life.

**NPC**  
This one is borrowed from video game language, meaning a non-playable character. If someone is called an "NPC," it might mean they're not making their own decisions or standing out much.

**OPP**  
This term can be tricky. An "opp" could be someone admired from afar but could also have negative connotations if used to describe rivalry or dislike.

**TEEN TERMS NOTATING CONCERNING BEHAVIOR**



**ICK**  
When someone or something suddenly turns off your teen, causing a strong feeling of disgust. It's worth checking in to understand what triggered this strong reaction.

**TURNT UP**  
This could mean getting overly excited or involved in risky behaviors. If you hear this a lot, it might be time for a chat about safe limits.

**FOMO**  
The term FOMO is an acronym for "Fear Of Missing Out" and can point to struggles with social anxiety or relationship issues. These terms highlight the importance of open dialogue about online and offline relationships. In some cases, it can be used in a lighthearted way.

**HOSTED**  
When someone is "hosted," it means they've suddenly been cut off from communication with another person. For example, if two people are texting each other consistently and one of them suddenly stops for an extended period of time, they're ghosting the other.

**STOP SERIOUS IMPLICATIONS**



**BODY COUNT**  
Referring to how many people someone has been intimate with. This term can be a red flag for discussions on self-worth and respect in relationships.

**CANON EVENT**  
If a teen talks about a "canon event" shaping them, it could mean a significant, sometimes traumatic, life event. Listening and supporting are key here.

**420**  
A direct reference to marijuana. If this term pops up, it might be an opportunity to discuss substance use and its impacts.

**NETFLIX & CHILL**  
What sounds like a cozy night in is often slang for hooking up. It's a good idea to ask about healthy relationships and consent if this term comes up.
